

# Book shows kids lunches from other countries

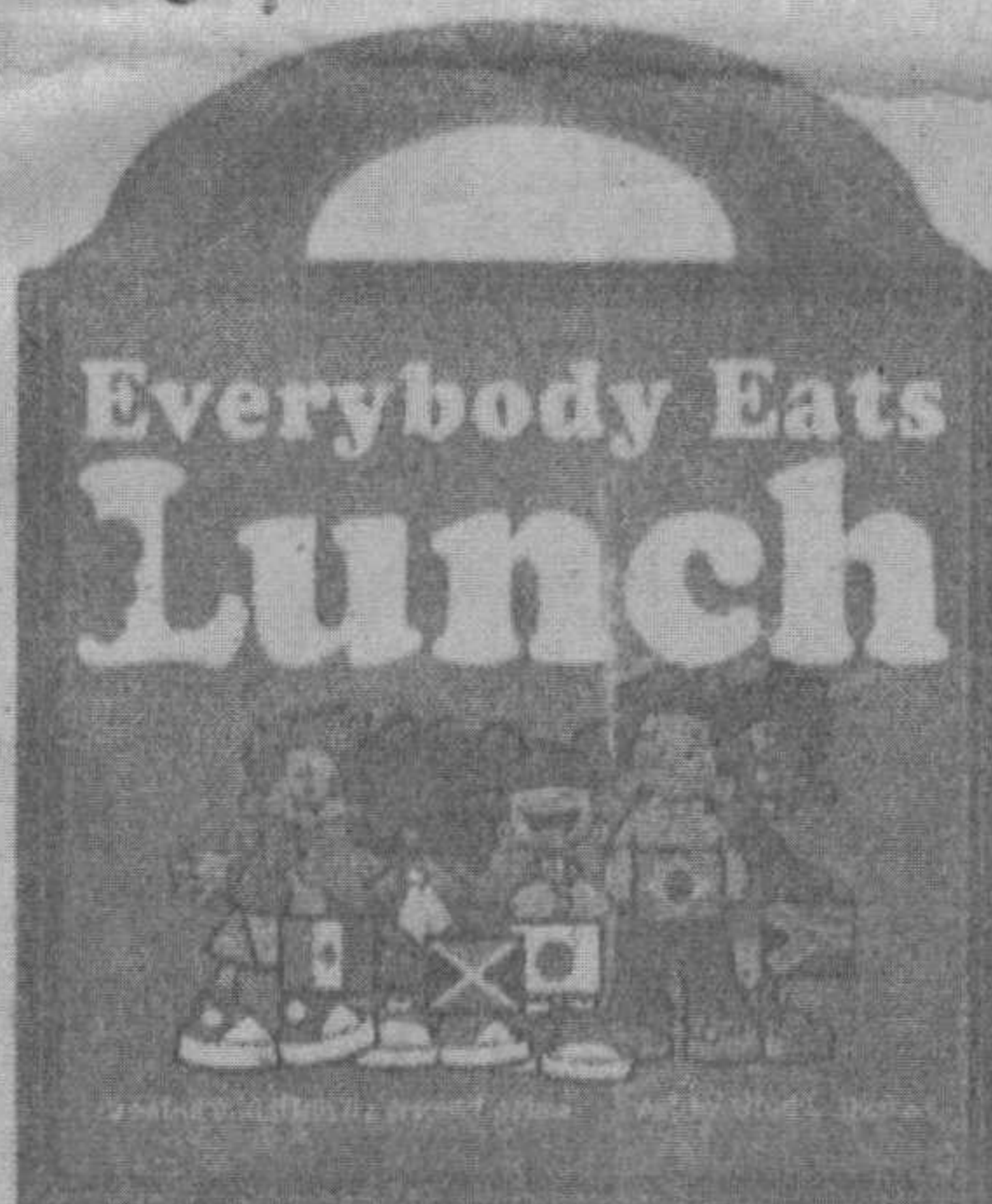
